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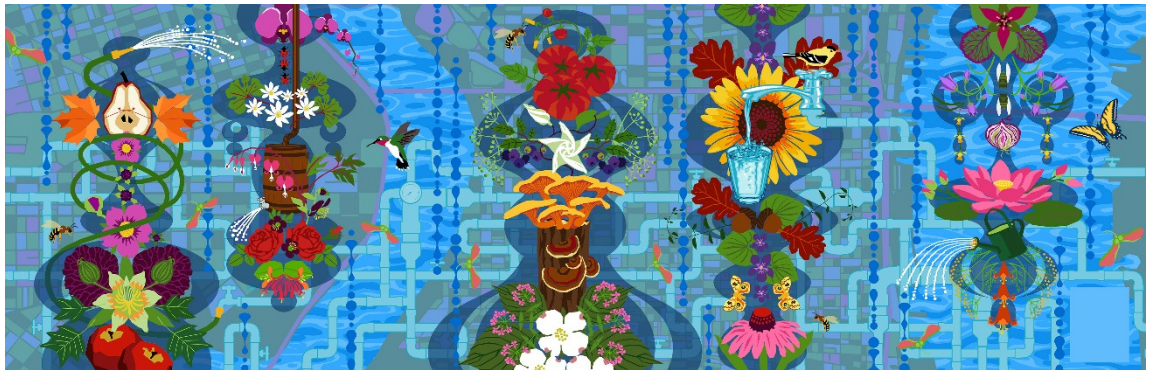
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MURAL ARTS PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY, AND PHILADELPHIA WATER DEPARTMENT UNVEIL DESIGN OF NEW MURAL

PHILADELPHIA – March 1, 2018 – Mural Arts Philadelphia, Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, and Philadelphia Water Department announce a new mural project, *Water Gives Life* by Eurhi Jones and David McShane. *Water Gives Life* will celebrate the present innovations and future vision of these organizations to bring forward-thinking sustainability and beauty to Philadelphia, improving the quality of urban life. The mural is a reimagining of the Mural Arts Philadelphia and Pennsylvania Horticultural Society mural painted by McShane in 1998 at the same location. This enormous (42-foot x 115-foot) work of art will continue to bring a magnified celebration of nature right to the heart of Center City at 13th and Arch Streets.

Celebrating the union between Philadelphia's rivers and local flora, the mural will contain imagery of plants and water. Totem-like arrangements of plant life and pollinators float over a stylized view of Philadelphia. Echoing raindrops, the botanical arrangements were inspired by the elegant hanging wire sculptures of the Japanese-American sculptor Ruth Asawa. Color blocks create an aerial view of the city from the Schuylkill to the Delaware. Woven throughout the composition is the complex network of pipes that deliver clean water throughout the urban

landscape. Nestled among the flowers are fruits and vegetables cultivated in the local ecosystem - which serve as symbols of our access to clean water. *Water Gives Life* marks the third art installation Eurhi Jones has created in conjunction with PWD. In 2015, Jones and PWD created *Waterways*, a temporary art project in Manayunk that used wildlife-themed art decals on sidewalks and buildings to highlight a major water infrastructure project at the renovated Venice Island Performing Arts and Recreation Center.

Jane Golden, Executive Director of Mural Arts Philadelphia, said, “Mural Arts Philadelphia has enjoyed longstanding partnerships with both the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society and Philadelphia Water Department. We love that art can bring our organizations together again to create a beautiful new piece of art for the public to enjoy and celebrate.”

The mural will be underway this spring, with public paint days planned for spring and summer when members of the public can participate in the creation of the project. These free opportunities welcome painters of all abilities and ages to come get their paintbrushes wet and participate in one or more events. All supplies will be provided. The mural is scheduled to be dedicated in October 2018.



“Whether it is in the rivers that provide our drinking water or in the pipes that connect every home and business to our treatment plants, water is extremely important to our city,” said **Philadelphia Water Department Commissioner Debra McCarty**. “We’re excited about this mural’s focus on water and want to recognize Mural Arts and PHS for working with us in neighborhoods across the city to start conversations about the importance of infrastructure and protecting our rivers.”

“The dynamic interplay between people, plants, and our region’s water supply, is emblematic of the kind of unique collaboration that is needed to effect positive change in our neighborhoods, such as our Rain Check program and PWD’s *Green City, Clean Waters* plan,” said **Matt**

Rader, PHS President. “As this year’s Philadelphia Flower Show explores the ‘Wonders of Water,’ we are excited to partner with both Mural Arts Philadelphia and PWD on this mural, bringing much needed attention to the importance of clean, quality water in our communities.”

About the Artists

Eurhi Jones and **David McShane**, who have been art and life partners for 20 years, met as students at the nearby Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts. **Eurhi Jones** has been painting murals with the Philadelphia Mural Arts Program since 1999. She has created murals at schools, recreation centers, playgrounds, and garden spaces around Philadelphia. Her murals appear in the Please Touch Museum, at the Philadelphia Zoo, on Bodine High School, and at community gardens in Brewerytown and West Philadelphia. In addition to painting, she works with textiles, fabric sculpture, and embroidery. She has shown work at the Asian Arts Initiative, University City Arts League, Main Line Arts Center, Abington Arts Center, Wallingford Community Art Center, and the Philadelphia International Airport. Eurhi was raised in Swarthmore, Pennsylvania and is a graduate of Wesleyan University and the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts.

David McShane has been painting for the Philadelphia Mural Arts Program since 1996, and has completed over 100 large, outdoor, community-based murals in the Philadelphia area. His murals include over a dozen elementary school transformations projects in partnership with the Philadelphia Eagles, the Phillies Mural, the Philadelphia Stars Negro League Mural, the Herman Wrice Mural, the Larry Fine Mural, the Jackie Robinson Mural, several fallen police officer and firefighter tribute murals, and the original Pennsylvania Horticultural Society Mural. Outside of Philadelphia, David has received grants to create community murals in Coatesville and Middletown Township, PA, Dublin, Ireland, and in the suburbs of Paris, France. He also creates fine art paintings in his studio, and has exhibited his work at the LaSalle University Art Museum, Artists’ House Gallery, Temple Gallery of the Tyler School of Art, the University City Arts League, the Philadelphia Office of Arts and Culture, and Nexus Gallery. David was raised in Audubon, New Jersey and received degrees from LaSalle University and the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts.
